15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary

PGDAV College offers various multidisciplinary courses of humanities, commerce and science at undergraduate level since its inception. Vision of the college has always been to provide a holistic, value-added learning environment to our students. In this direction, our college offers five interdisciplinary combinations of humanities, commerce and science in B.A. Programme. These are: Mathematics & Economics, Accounting and Finance & Economics, Computer Application & Economics, Computer Application & Mathematics, and Entrepreneurship and small business & Economics. Additionally, our college also offers B.Sc. Mathematical Sciences, which is a multidisciplinary course academically maintained by the departments of Computer Science, Mathematics and Statistics. This multidisciplinary course is only available in four colleges of University of Delhi, including our college. The college has been implementing 'Learning Outcomes based Curriculum Framework'(LOCF) based syllabus which is based on Credit Based Choice System(CBCS). This structure of learning makes explicitly each course a multidisciplinary in approach by the integration of Generic Elective subjects, Environment-Awareness subject and projects based on research-related skills etc. Further, the college is bound to follow the academic structure of the University of Delhi from time to time. The College is well prepared in advance for the implementation of new structure of learning, based on National Education Policy 2020, as soon as University of Delhi directs for adoptation of the same to its affiliating colleges. Our faculty members have been actively engaged in multidisciplinary research endeavours which are related to day-today issues of present society. Our college inculcates value addition to students' learning by combining education with community service guided by NSS and NCC.

16.Academic bank of credits (ABC):

Academic Bank of Credit is envisaged as a digital bank that holds the credit earned by a student in any course. It is a major instrument for facilitating multidisciplinary and holistic education and multiple entries and exit in higher education. The Academic Bank of Credits will enable students to select the best courses or combination of courses to suit their aptitude and to tailor their degrees or make specific modifications or specializations rather than undergoing the rigid, regularly prescribed degree or courses of a single university. As a constituent college of the University of Delhi, the institution's readiness to implement the Academic Bank of Credits is largely determined by the University of Delhi's guidelines. The college is waiting for the guidelines from the university. The Students are given recognition for participating in sports or extra- curricular activities. The faculty encourage their Ph.D scholars to participate in MOOCs at Swayam platform such as the 'Research, Ethics and Plagiarism Course as a part of their Course work. Since 2020. The university has been using the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform to upload students' mark sheets and degree certificates. The National Academic Bank of Credits (ABC) portal has now been integrated into the nad.digitallocker.gov.in platform. For the majority of its programmes, university follows a choice-based credit system (CBCS) and is currently underway to pass a resolution related to ABC in the Academic Council. Once the resolution is approved by the higher academic bodies, DU will be officially registered on the ABC platform and college will process accordingly. A centralized database, as well as the college's database, will be required in order to digitally store the academic credits earned by the students from several courses so that the credit secured by the student formerly could be passed on when the student enters into the programme again. A proper technical support system will be required to monitor ABC, for which the Institution currently has the necessary prerequisites. The College has conducted many webinars which helped the faculty to teach through software and different ICT tools. The College has signed one MoU with Mahatma Hansraj Faculty Development Centre, Hansraj College. In upcoming years the college will also be trying to connect with other national and international institutions. Further, in line with the years recommendations of the National Education Policy 2020, credit transfer shall be allowed between national and international institutions as per policy prescribed by the University. As recommended by the National Education Policy 2020, a certificate will be awarded to the students who exit at the end of the first year after successfully fulfilling the academic requirements. During the academic year 2020-21, the college faculty is involved by the university to design/ revise curricula. The faculties have the

freedom to author/prepare/design books, reading material, pedagogy of teaching-learning process. Still the guidelines on ABC are awaited the college faculties are being encouraged to attend FDPs/workshops in this area. Students are recognized for their participation in various activities.

17.Skill development:

In line with the New Education Policy, PGDAV College has been actively engaged in improving skills of the students through workshops, certificate courses, enriching curriculum and varied electives.

The Department of Commerce and IQAC PGDAV College organised an online short-term certificate course on `Effective Communication Skills' from 12th April 2021 to 28th April 2021. The session was aimed at enhancing basic communication vocabulary and in removing the barriers encountered in effective communication.

The Department of Sanskrit and IQAC also organised a short term certificate course on "Sanskrit Sambhashan Shivir Avem Bhartiya Parampara: Samkaleen Pariprekshya" from 1st April 2021 to 15th April 2021 to impart Sanskrit speaking skills to the students. The course attempted to remove the misnomers and unease related to Sanskrit conversation and assist students in speaking Sanskrit confidently.

The Department of Economics organised a short term online course on "Data analysis using R" for the students of PGDAV College from 12th April 2021 to 29th April 2021. The certificate course was designed to introduce students to research in social sciences using R software. By the end of the course, students were equipped with the skills to manage datasets, clean and visualise data and perform econometric analysis on datasets.

Commercium, the Commerce Society of PGDAV College conducted two Webinars to enhance students' knowledge and interpersonal skills. The first one was held on 11th September 2020 on "Bulls and Bears: All About Stock Markets" by Harbinder Singh Sokhi, Manager, Investors' Protection Fund at Bombay Stock Exchange, who gave insights and in-depth knowledge about the stock market. The second one was held on 5th October 2020 on "Art of Success: Cracking Civil Services Exam" by IPS Ilma Afroz, alumni of Oxford University who shared her experiences and tips to help students crack civil services exams. KAIZEN, the Career Counselling Club of PGDAV College organised a special workshop on "Communication Skills and Resume Writing" conducted by Ms Sadaf Taher of ITM, Mumbai and also a

session on "How to write a research paper" conducted by Dr Monika Saini.

The College also conducted various activities to instill the values of truth, righteousness, citizenship values, etc. in the students. Nikhil Yadav from Vivekanand Kendra Delhi conducted a session on Yoga and Meditation to inculcate the practice of meditation, and instill values to perform and deliver selfless service to the society. Samvaad, The Political Science Society of PGDAV College, organised a multitude of events to create awareness about our Constitution and democratic values. A webinar was organised on the topic "Indian Constitution and Its Philosophy" and the speaker for the event was Professor Ujjwal Kumar Singh from the Department of Political Science, University of Delhi. It also organised a webinar on 'Know your Republic 2021', which had an immense participation from several colleges and universities. Overall the activities and courses conducted by the college helped in making the students confident, developing leadership skills, and other skills required to lead a better life in various situations.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

The PGDAV College itself is built on the teachings of Maharishi Dayanand, and it offers a welcoming atmosphere for learning through the traditional cultural practices of the Indian Knowledge system. According to the National Education Policy, PGDAV College has actively integrated the Indian Knowledge system into the college through workshops, certificate programs, enriched curricula, and various electives. Philosophical foundations of the various disciplines, that are part of the Indian Knowledge system, have been introduced under various elective courses.

The College management has monthly meetings to guarantee that lessons are taught in bilingual mode smoothly. Teachers are teaching in a bilingual format to create a welcoming environment for pupils who are more at ease speaking their native tongue. Vernacular language is used in the special tutorial sessions.

The Department of History conducted a Lecture in April 2021, on the topic "Why Study History". The keynote speaker of the lecture was Prof P.K Basant and the event was based on the importance of history learning from an Indian perspective and the need of Indian literature to learn and teach history.

On 30th July 2021 the college organized a Webinar on "Kautilya Ki

Prashashan Vyavastha". The aim of the webinar was to give information about the ancient Indian political system which was highly organized and decentralized in an administrative manner. Department of Political Science offer such papers based on the ancient Indian political system.

Department of Sanskrit offers a paper on culture and language in the Indian knowledgedge system. It also promotes the Sanskrit language by offering interdisciplinary papers. To give the students Sanskrit speaking abilities, the Department of Sanskrit and IQAC also offered a short-term certificate course on "Sanskrit Sambhashan Shivir Avem Bhartiya Parampara: Samkaleen Pariprekshya" from April 1 to April 15, 2021. The training aimed to help pupils speak Sanskrit fluently by dispelling misconceptions and discomfort about the language.

Department of Hindi runs courses on Lok Sahitya, Bhasha aur Samaj, which are important to generate deep-rooted knowledge of ancient Indian tradition under the banner of the Indian Knowledge system. A workshop was organized on December, 2020 by the Hindi department on writings of Ram Dhari Singh Dinkar and the main focus was on his "Samskriti k Char Adhyaya". It was a great learning experience for the students to enhance their cultural knowledge.

A group of students under the mentorship of faculties runs a study circle in collaboration with Vivekanand Kendra. which regularly holds Yoga sessions and academic activities. It helps students to understand the values and ethos of Indian culture and traditions. SAMVAAD society of the Department of Political Science conducted the seminar on "Ancient Indian Democratic Values". which provided the awareness about that ancient democratic traditions such as Vaishali the oldest democracy in the world belonged to India.

Within the confines of NEP 2020, the aforementioned college activities helped students develop a grasp of the Indian Knowledge System.

19. Focus on Outcome based education (OBE): Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The College bustles with student activities throughout the year. These range from curricular activities taken up by the departmental societies of the college and the co-curricular ones undertaken by student clubs under the convenorship of teachers. They offer experiential learning and problem-solving opportunities to all the students. Students learn how to organize events such as seminars, workshops, academic talks, cultural programmes and competitions and thereby practise teamwork and leadership. Their

participation in various intra and interdepartment and college competitions give them an opportunity to test their capability and give them exposure for practical application of classroom teaching in the real world. This year, students have channeled their energies into organizing and participating in online events. This is besides honing crucial skills in the virtual classrooms through guided lessons and usage of functional software and subscriptions that the college invests in. For example, the college has taken subscription of CMIE database PROWESS so that students can understand data extraction and analysis. Remote access to various online journals is provided for students through their library membership to give them uninterrupted connectivity to resources and data.

20.Distance education/online education:

Presently, the college is not offering any vocational courses through ODL mode. However, our college is a study centre for PG courses offered by IGNOU where physical contact programs are being held. Our college is also a study centre for SOL and NCWEB, DU.

With the advent of technology, online education has become an increasingly popular method for educational institutions to deliver their courses and programs. Educational technology will play an important role in the improvement of educational processes and outcomes. Recognizing this importance of technology, NEP 2020, the flagship program of Digital India campaign, envisaged transforming the entire nation into a digitally empowered society and knowledge economy. During the COVID-19 pandemic in the academic year 2020-2021, PGDAV, being one of the oldest constituent colleges of Delhi university , implemented various methods of online education to ensure the continuity of the teaching-learning process. These measures aimed to facilitate effective learning while adhering to social distancing guidelines and ensuring the safety of students and faculty. The most common approach was the transition to virtual classes using video conferencing platforms like Zoom, Microsoft Teams and Google Meet. Faculty conducted live lectures, that allowed students to attend classes remotely. This method ensured real-time interaction, where students could ask questions, participate in discussions, and receive immediate feedback from instructors. Faculty members extensively utilized LMS platforms such as Google Meet, Google Classroom, or Microsoft Teams to provide course materials, assignments, and assessments online.

These platforms allow instructors to upload lecture notes, readings, multimedia resources, and interactive activities for students to access at their convenience. Students can submit assignments

electronically and receive feedback from instructors through the LMS. The college issues institutional e - mail IDs to all faculty members and bona- fide students of the college so that faculty members can keep the record of students joining the class. Many classrooms are equipped with LCD Projection Systems, computer and internet connectivity etc. Apart from classrooms with projectors, there are five computer labs with 200 computers. These facilities enhance lecture delivery, effective communication and in-class assessments.

College exclusively subscribes to N LIST resources, which has 97000 e-books and 6000 e-journals. The DULS provides a remote log-in facility for all the PG and research students and faculty members of the university. The College, too, organised two webinar series, namely "Transforming Teaching Learning Process using ICT Tools -Basic course and Transforming Teaching Learning Process using ICT Tools -Professional course", to equip its faculty with the latest and most efficacious ICT tools required to adapt to the new educational environment. To accommodate students with varying schedules or internet connectivity issues, many faculty members recorded lectures and made them available for on-demand viewing. Students could access these recordings at their convenience, enabling self-paced learning and review of complex topics.

CURRICULAR ASPECTS

1.1 - Curricular Planning and Implementation

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process

All the departments in college prepare and plan the execution of their syllabus and related activities well in advance at the start of the academic session to ensure effective implementation of the curriculum for smoother functioning and academic excellence. Departmental workloads and time-tables are also prepared before the commencement of each semester. Time-tables, both faculty-wise and class-wise, are posted on the college website and displayed on the college notice-boards for the convenience of students. PGDAV College follows the prescribed curriculum, academic calendar, syllabi and other guidelines of the University of Delhi. The College teachers contributed to the development, revision and implementation of curriculum under the guidance of their respective university departments.

Following the practice of previous years, the college organized on orientation programme on the very first day of the session for students along with their parents. Matters related to the teaching-learning process, assessments, internal marks and examinations were simplified and charted out to familiarize the students with the university and college system. Departments organized their separate discipline specific orientations to provide insights about the regular and advanced readings, reference material and subject scope. The college societies and departments received much appreciation for the systematic introduction to the curriculum and college life.

The departments also ensured that special attention is given to address the needs of both the slow and advanced learners through remedial classes held in the last week before the semester-end.

The students enhanced their knowledge in various subjects by correlating the topics and themes with contemporary research material shared by subject experts introduced through value-added courses, field projects, seminars, conferences, and workshops. Students availed the opportunities provided by active use of multimedia and other accessible tools including suitable you- tube lectures, research websites, film

With the onset of COVID-19 in the beginning of the year, the whole system witnessed a great disruption and the college shifted to online mode of teaching. College organized several webinars to train the teachers for online teaching. Teachers were asked to submit weekly teaching plans and study material was uploaded on college website. Departments held regular monthly online meetings to review and emphasize on satisfactory covering of curriculum syllabus.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

PGDAV College gives highest priority to inculcate ethics and values among its students in order to contribute towards a healthy, progressive, equitable, culturally rooted and sustainable society. With this view, wherever possible, various departments of the College consciously opt for courses in their curriculum which deal with issues like professional ethics, gender sensitization, sensitivity towards human values, environment consciousness and sustainability. For example English department offers courses on Women and empowerment in contemporary India and partition literature; Economics department offers papers on public policies and development paradigm such as public economics and development economics, Department of Political Science has separate papers on Gandhi and Ambedkar; Department of History has offered two papers on women and gender; Departments of Hindi and Sanskrit have papers on community, culture and gender; Department of Commerce offers papers for enriching professional ethics and values; and the Department of Environment teaches a compulsory course on environmental studies (AECC- I) which aims to train students to cater to the need forecological citizenship through development of a strong foundation on the critical linkages between ecology-society-economy.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

The College dedicatedly caters to the diverse learning capabilities of its students. Besides committing to quality teaching in classrooms and laboratories, the faculty is constantly on the lookout for slow as well as advanced learners. This year, owing to the COVID-19 pandemic, the online teaching and learning process has posed challenges of various kinds to students across the University. Our College has taken recourse to the established mentor-mentee programme to address the problem of learning gaps faced by students especially during the time of online teaching. Teachers use classroom attendance, classroom participation, internal assessment performance and tutorial sessions to gauge students' calibers and to address either their lack or their keenness for better academic achievement. Students are counselled with utmost empathy during this difficult time in tutorial classes. The concerned subject teachers offer help and remedial measures to poor performers. They also give recognition to meritorious students and guide them for further achievement. Student performance is shared with respective mentors and the mentors in turn ensure that their mentees follow up on remedial measures recommended to them. For advanced learners and achievers, the College has societies like Placement Cell, Kaizen (the career counseling club) as well as various departmental and cultural societies which offer the students opportunities to share their ideas, leadership qualities and academic prowess through workshops, seminars, talks and short-term courses. These measures propel them onto a higher platform to launch them further towards their desired academic or professional journeys.

2.3 - Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 - Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

The College bustles with student activities throughout the year. These range from curricular activities taken up by the department societies of the college and the co-curricular ones undertaken by student clubs under the convenorship of teachers. They offer experiential learning and problem-solving opportunities to all the students. Students learn how to organize events such as seminars, workshops, academic talks, cultural programmes and competitions and thereby practice teamwork and leadership. Colleges under the University of Delhi resumed classes online after the closure of campuses in March 2020 upon the outbreak of the Covid-19 pandemic. The entire teaching-learning process was now

experienced online through flipped classrooms. This being the new reality of all learning institutions across the world, the College felt the need to equip its faculty with skills to adapt to the new educational environment by imparting them knowledge of the latest and most efficacious ICT tools. For this purpose, the College organized not one, but two webinar series namely Transforming Teaching Learning Process using ICT Tools -Basic course and Transforming Teaching Learning Process using ICT Tools -Professional course. The basic series took place from 23rd to 25th July 2020 with seven resource persons and the professional series between 28th to 30th August 2020 with four resource persons. Diligently attended by faculty members not only from our college but teachers from across the nation, the webinar sessions trained attendees how to make online teaching interactive, how to share resources, an acquaintance with open education resources, quick and effective test and assessment tools as well as administrative management and data handling. The much-needed knowledge of ICT enabled tools facilitated smooth collaboration, comprehension and communication between teachers and students to continue classroom-like teaching-learning experience during the pandemic.

The college has followed University of Delhi guidelines [Ref no: Dean (Exams)/2020/3216; dated 31st October 2020] in conducting internal assessment as a special measure due to the Covid-19 pandemic for this year. As mandated by the University, instead of three existing components of internal assessment which comprised of class test, home assignment and attendance, only one component viz., only one assignment submitted online is to be considered for internal assessment. Teachers have ensured that ample time and adequate instruction have been given to all students for timely submission of this lone component of the internal assessment on Google Classroom. Measures have been taken to reach out to students who may face difficulty in connecting to online classes regularly. Topics given for assignment have been taught and revised thoroughly so that students can attempt the assignment with relative ease and confidence. Marks are intimated to students well on time. If any student's performance has been found to be unsatisfactory, teachers have addressed their shortcomings in tutorial classes. Mentors are also notified so that they can follow up on the students' progress. Remedial assignments are encouraged to be submitted by those students who wish to improve upon their performance.

The College follows University of Delhi's curriculum, namely the Learning Outcomes-based Curriculum Framework (LOCF), wherein learning objectives and outcomes have been clearly spelled out. Faculty members follow the syllabus' directives on lesson plans, timeframe, teaching-learning activities and assessment tasks to facilitate the achievement of course learning outcomes. Lectures and tutorial classes are thus planned and executed in a manner that will do justice to the learning outcomes that a student is expected to have acquired. These classes, through interaction and participation of the students, form the first indicators for evaluating programme and course outcomes. Also, the University delegates colleges to conduct 25% weightage of the final assessment and evaluation through the Internal Assessment (IA) mechanism. This is done throughout the course of the semester, by conducting class tests, home assignments and project work from time to time. Besides these, attendance of classes is an important index to indicate effective learning of course objectives. Remedial lessons, whenever needed, are imparted based on the performance of the students in IA. The College also assesses programme and course outcomes through internal review of semesters results.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

The College campus is spread out over 7.12 acres and has wellventilated, spacious classrooms, laboratories, and other facilities for effective teaching-learning process. There are 52 classrooms, 12 tutorial rooms, 6 computer labs and 2 seminar halls. New and old seminar hall has a seating capacity of 300 and 100 each respectively. The College is fully wi-fi enabled and there are 20 classrooms with projectors, a medical room and a staff room provided with locker facilities for teachers and separate departmental rooms with lockers, and a spacious parking area for college staff. There is a well-equipped multi-purpose block over the canteen which is used for organizing cultural activities. To make teaching-learning accessible for the differently-abled students, related facilities like ramps, wheelchairs, washrooms etc are provided in the campus. The library is stocked with updated reading software for the visually impaired. The College has 120 laptops, 125 desktops and a server room operating 20 CCTV cameras. Dedicated computing equipment is provided instantly, in classrooms, labs, departmental rooms, staff room and in other activities whenever required. All the teachers successfully used ICT enabled tools for optimum teaching and learning process, especially under the lockdown conditions of COVID 19 pandemic.

For holistic development of students, the college gives due importance to sports and extra-curricular activities. Adequate facilities for outdoor games such as Football, Cricket, Basketball, Boxing, Judo, and Taekwondo are provided. The sports facilities include Cricket Ground (70 meter long boundaries), and Football (100 meter length x 70 meter width). Facilities for indoor games such as Chess, Table-Tennis and Carromare also provided. College also has a well-equipped Gymnasium cum Yoga Centre. The Gymnasium has Treadmill, Bicycle ergometer, Weight Balls, Dumbles, Rubber and Iron Plates etc. College has extensive facilities for smooth conduction of cultural activities. Dedicated room is allotted

to the Cultural Society of the college, which is well equipped with musical instruments required for practice by the students. Regular programmes are held in the old Seminar Hall, which has a seating capacity of 100 students. College fests and events attracting large audience are held in the New Seminar Hall which has a seating capacity of 300 students.

The library had automated itself in the year 2004 using the Library Management Software, NETLIB (updated with version 3.0.3 in 2009). Three terminals are dedicated to OPAC for checking the availability of books in the library. The library is wi-fi enabled with two computer labs, for students as well as faculty with a total of 20 computers enabling easy access to the vast e-resources available through several platforms. Library boasts of huge collection of 100998 print books and subscribes to 75 periodicals and 19 newspapers. College exclusively subscribes to N LIST resources which has 97000 e-books and 6000 e-journals. The DULS provides remote login facility to all the PG and research students and faculty members of the University. During the COVID 19 lockdown, 3500 students and faculty membersbenefitted through NLIST resources. The college library has book bank collection of 12497 books for needy and meritorious students. Differently-abled students can reach college library premise with the help of fully operational lift. Several assistive devices and softwares like Braille S/w JAWS, ANGEL DAISY Reader, MP3 Recorder, Laptops, Zoom X Instant Text Reader, Lex Portable Camera etc. are made available to differently abled users to support in their teaching and learning process.

The infrastructural facilities such as classrooms, canteen, sports complex etc. are maintained and repaired on the recommendations of the Caretaker Committee. Committees like Lawns and Garden Committee, Library Committee, Sports Committee, Canteen Committee etc., are empowered to make suggestions regarding upkeep and enhancement of their respective resource areas. Supporting infrastructural assets such as Lifts, Computers, Printers, Fire Extinguishers, and RO Systems etc. are maintained through AMCs. There are non-teaching staff members to carry out electrical, plumbing, carpentry and other housekeeping work on a regular basis. 6.2 - Strategy Development and Deployment

In the wake of the Covid-19 pandemic and the subsequent nationwide lockdown in March 2020, the Colleges needed to use online mode for classes and activities. Taking the monumental challenges in stride, the College's Placement cell seamlessly maintained its operations online.

We came up with new endeavours by turning the adversity into an opportunity. An 'Alumni Connect Session' was conducted, featuring alumni from EY and Deloitte who shared insights into the hiring process followed by these reputed organizations. Secondly, teacher coordinators conducted sessions to prepare students for technical rounds of interviews, focusing on fundamental accounting concepts and Advanced Excel skills.

The Placement Cell also collaborated with Coursera, offering free access to over 1500 courses from renowned universities worldwide. Additionally, the cell established its website to streamline operations and provide easy access to internship and placement-related information. Students could register on the website and directly apply for opportunities.

Despite the lack of physical campus exposure, the Placement Cell successfully organized the 5th Edition of its flagship event, CONVERGE, on 2nd March 2021. The Internship Fair was conducted using a unique virtual platform, which recreated an offline experience through a 3D mapped setup.

To achieve institutional goals of excellence, the college complies with a performance appraisal system in colleges for both teaching and non-teaching staff, which enhances productivity and fosters a culture of quality work.

The college is following the teaching appraisal scheme suggested by the Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) provided under the 'UGC Regulations on Minimum Qualifications for Appointment of Teachers and other Academic Staff in Universities and Colleges and Measures for the Maintenance of Standards in Higher Education 2018'.
